Factors are numbers that evenly divide into another number, and a prime factor is a factor that is a prime number. A factor tree is a tool that breaks down any number in its prime factors. Factor trees are useful tools for students because they provide a graphical representation of the most important factors that can be divided into a particular number. Factor trees are so named because once made, they look a bit like a tree. The worksheets below give students practice in making factor trees. For example, the free printable numbers, such as 28, 44, 99, or 76, and ask students to create a factor tree for each. Some worksheets provide some of the most important factors and ask students to complete the rest; others require students to create factor trees from scratch. In each section, the worksheet is first printed with an identical worksheet underneath with the answers to facilitate the review. D. Russell Discover how much students know about creating factor trees by letting them complete this worksheet first. It requires students to make every factor tree from scratch. Before students start this worksheet, explain that there is often more than one way to do this when factors the numbers. It doesn't matter what numbers they use, because they always end up with the same prime factors of the number. For example, the most important factors for 60 are 2, 3, and 5, as the sample problem shows. D. Russell For this worksheet, students find the primes for each number listed using a factor structure. When students are struggling, this worksheet can help them master the concept. It provides some of the factors, and students fill the rest in the provided empty spaces. For example, in the first problem, students are asked to find the factors of the number 99. The first factor, 3, is mentioned for them. The students then find the other factors, such as 33 (3 x 33), which further factors in the primes 3 x 3 x 11. D. Russell This worksheet gives struggling students more help in controlling factor trees, as some of the most important factors are foreseen for them. For example, the number 64 factors in 2 x 34, but students can further factor that number into prime factors of 2 x 2 x 17, because the number 34 can factor in 2 x 17. D. Russell This worksheet provides some of the factors to help students create factor trees. If students are struggling, explain that the first number, 86, can only be processed in 43 and 2, because both digits are primes. 99, on the other hand, may take into account 3 x 12, which can further lead to (2 x 4) x (2 x 6), which are further factors in the prime factors (2 x 2 x 2) x (2 x 3 x 2). D. Russell Finish your factor tree lesson with this worksheet that also gives students some factors for each number. For Practice, students have to complete these worksheets that allow them to find the most important factors of numbers without using factor trees.
